


What do we know about parenting?

- Parenting has been linked to a variety of child outcomes, including school achievement, health outcomes, and criminality in adolescence^{1,2,3}
- Parenting is complex, but empirically has been described as having two facets: control and warmth **High Control**



Research Questions

- How does parenting style relate to parenting behaviors?
- How do measures of parenting relate to child behaviors like helping and compliance?
- How is each person in the dyadic relationship affected by different situations (i.e. time-pressure)


Participants

- \circ Participants were 3 to 4.5 year-old children (N = 3.5) M = 3.92, SD = 0.41) and majority white (N = 27).
- Eighteen female and 17 male children were tested, and 30 mothers and 5 fathers were tested.

Methods

- Helping Task^{6,7}
- Inhibition Task - Inhibit Child Behaviors
- Puzzle Task⁸ 3. - Elicit Child Behaviors
- Challenge Task⁸ 4. - Elicit Child Behaviors



2. Relationship Between Parenting & Child Behaviors:

- We hypothesized that authoritative scores would positively correlate with child helping and compliance, and authoritarian scores would negatively correlate with helping.
- However, no significant correlations between parent measures and child behaviors were found.



Conclusions & Future Directions

- Using behavioral measures leads to a more robust understanding of individual parenting practices and effects.
- The dyadic relationship is affected by context.
- Studies in parenting should incorporate behavioral measures and a comfortable testing environment in order to measure the full range of unique parenting tendencies.
